Warden is now in possession of said mine

U. S. Surveyor-General for California:

Sir: In compliance with the provisions of the Revised Statutes of the United States, Chapter 216, Title Thirty-two, and instructions issued thereunder, we herewith make application for an official survey of the mining claim known as the Silver King Mine, claimed by Thomas C. Warden, John C. King, N. H. Thomas, Ellis J.

The Silver King Qts. Mining Claim is situated about six miles in a northerly direction from the Mohave river

A plain extends from the river to the foot of the mountains which is about a mile below the mine, a large part of this plain is the dry bed of an alkali lake,

The mountains rise abruptly and abound in narrow chasms with perpendicular or over hanging walls which are in places two hundred feet or more in height

The mining claim lies at an angle from twenty to forty degrees on the southern face of a bare rock

The surface is exceedingly rough with high pillars and deep fissures

The formation is porphyry of a hard and dry character in many places capped with a very hard reddish brown lava like rock which has a cellular and slag like appearance and when struck it gives a sound almost as sharp as iron.

The vein or mineral bearing rock is spar much of it highly stained with iron.

The walls of the mine are well defined and at the lowest depth reached are firm and free from slides and breaks.

The vein between the walls is from three to eighteen feet wide in most places, measuring from eight to twelve ft. with about eight or ten inches of selvage or gouge

The vertical dip is about eighty degrees.

The ore is easily crushed and free from rebellious matter in milling

The lowest depth reached on the mine, is one hundred and ninety feet.

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IMPROVEMENTS.

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The improvements consist of three hundred and twenty feet of main tunnels, four and a half feet wide, by seven feet high; a winze seventy five feet deep, two principal shafts, one seventy feet, the other ninety feet deep and a number of adits, cuts, tunnels and prospecting shafts at different points on the claim, three hundred and fifty feet of street car iron track iron cars; turn tables, air pipes and ventilators; windlasses and attachments, mining blacksmith and carpenter tools, mining timbers, awnings; dumps, roads, trails, boarding and lodging house, aggregate value four thousand dollars

The claim is joined on the east by the Oriental claim which is being developed and which presents the same general features, on the Northeast by the Little Bonanza which is also being developed, on the north by the Calico Queen, on the northwest, west and southwest by the Burning Moscow, Red Jacket, Red Cloud, Mammoth and other conflicting locations the rights to which are being contested in the Courts.

Yager, Frank Meacham citizens of the United States over the age of twenty-one years, having discovered a vein or lode of quartz or rock in place bearing mineral, within the limits of the claim hereby located have this day under and in accordance with the Revised Statutes of the United States, Chapter Six, Title Thirty two, located (1500) linear feet of this vein or lode with surface ground (600) feet in width, situated in Grape Vine Mining District, County of San Bernardino, State of California, and known as the Silver King Quartz Mining Claim, and extending (1200) feet S. E. to Monument marked (S. E.) end monument and (300 feet north west to north west monument from this notice at the discovery, the exterior boundaries of this claim being distinctly marked by reference to some natural object or permanent monument and more particularly described as follows to wit:

GRAPE VINE RANCHMOHAVE RIVERSAN BERNARDINO COUNTYSTATE OF CALIFORNIA.

MAY 5, 1861.

At the house of E. J. Miller it was resolved that
a Mining District be formed, whereupon

Mr. R. B. Mc. Cullough was called to act
President of the meeting & Geo. Hamilton, Secretary

It was resolved that a mining District be formed
and organized to be called and known as the Grape Vine
District, bounded and described as follows,

Beginning at a point known as the Cotton Wood
Station, on the Mohave River, thence running an easterly
course to the forks of the road, at Hawleys station,
thence running a northerly course to a place known as
Paradise Valley, thence running a westerly course about
twenty five miles to a place known as Blacks Ranch,
thence to Cotton Wood Station, to the place of beginning

Resolved that the Officers of this District con-
sist of a President, Secretary, and Recorder, to serve
for the term of one year

Resolved, that the mining Laws of the United
States, be adopted on Notice,

Resolved, that the Secretary be and is hereby
authorized and empowered to call all meetings of the
District for the transaction of business and shall give

notice thereof not less than ten days and that for the amendment of or revision of the bylaws a notice shall be published in one or more papers in the county, thirty days previous to said meetings and business shall be transacted at said meeting except thereby present at least two thirds ~~of~~ of the legal locators adopted.

On motion resolved that it shall be the duty of the Recorder to keep a book of Record and record all claims therein made in accordance with the requirements of Chapter Six, Title Thirty-two, of the Revised Statutes and the laws, customs and regulations of this District and the Recorder shall receive as compensation for such record the sum of one dollar and a mileage of twenty five cents on way for each recorded claim to be paid by the locator

On motion of Geo. Hamilton & seconded by Powley Heap E. J. Miller was nominated for Recorder and unanimously elected

On motion the president and Secretary of this meeting be declared the officers of the District for the term of one year from this date, Adopted.

It was resolved that each locator shall have on each location seven monuments, one in the center of the location and three at each end directly in a line with each other and that each corner monument shall have a notice in it stating what corner it may be and the name of the mine.

It was resolved that Sec. 5 of Mining Statutes of May 10, 1872, be adopted as follows:

That the miners of each mining District may make laws rules and regulations not in conflict with the laws of the United States or with the laws of the State or territory in which the District is situated governing

the location manner of recording amount of work necessary to hold possession of a mining claim, subject to the following requirements.

The location must be distinctly marked on the ground so that its boundaries can be readily traced, all records of mining claims hereafter made shall contain the name of names of the locators the date of this location and such a description of the claim or claims located by reference to some natural object or permanent monument as will identify the claim on each claim on each claim located after the passage of this act and until a patent shall have been issued therefor not less than one hundred dollars worth of labor shall be performed or improvements made during each year.

It was moved and seconded that 20 days be the limit granted by this District for Recording. carried
